FELICIAN SISTERS Celebrate 150 YEAR ANNIVERSARY



St. Ignatius Community Services is a sponsored ministry of the Felician Sisters, a Catholic congregation of women founded in 1855 in Warsaw, Poland, by Blessed Mary Angela Truszkowska. Inspired by St. Francis of Assisi, the Felician Sisters dedicate themselves to serving others, particularly the poor and marginalized,

and are known for their commit-

ment to education, healthcare, social services and youth development. They have a global presence, including North America, when five Felician Sisters journeyed here in 1874 to work with Polish immigrants in Wisconsin. Since then, they have established schools, universities, hospitals, elderly care facilities, affordable housing, and social services throughout the United States and Canada.

A special gathering to honor the gift of the Felician Sisters in North America was recently held in Lodi, NJ on September 21,

2025. This was one of many celebrations of their 150^{th} Anniversary and was

attended by over 225 people which included 2 bishops, 10 priests, almost 50 Felician Sisters (from Lodi and other regions of North America and Rome,) and guest religious, Felician Associates, lay partners from Lodi and Beaver Falls, representatives of Felician Services Inc. and of various sponsored institutions. Also attending were students, clients, benefactors and colleagues of the Sisters from countless ministries. All who attended rejoiced in the special bond that brought them together this day. It was the



power of the charism of the foundress of the Felician Sisters, Blessed Mary Angela Truszkowska. The theme of the program book was most appropriate: "The Lord has done great things for us. We are filled with JOY."







To mark the 150th Anniversary, artist Jen Norton created this commissioned artwork. Blessed Mary Angela gives her blessings as the sisters leave from Poland, surrounded by Kraków Cathedral and Polish folk art elements. This artwork depicts their journey by ship, train and cart to Polonia, WI, where they are welcomed by immigrant children, with subtle nods to the American flag in the sky and garden.
